The Virtues are a part of our school culture, shape our approach to the world and cannot be excluded from the learning students do in the various subject disciplines and in their daily lives.

Visible Signs of our Faith:

Through symbol and service, we are instruments of God's love whose work within our communities stands as a witness to our faith.

Our call to discipleship and service are evident throughout St. Matthew School. Each classroom has a clearly identifiable Sacred Space in a prominent place that can serve as a focus for classroom prayer and reflection. Our liturgical committee ensures that each classroom is equipped with the necessary materials to pray as a group and ensure that the seasons of the liturgical year are represented in the sacred space.

As visitors are welcomed to St. Matthew Catholic School, the Catholic identity of our community is evident immediately upon entry through the altar and sacred space present in the foyer of the building. Throughout the school, various Catholic School Graduate Expectations are posted where all can see.

These visible reminders help us to focus our learning and interactions on the key tenets of our shared faith. Through the actions of staff and students, our Catholic faith is lived out daily at St. Matthew.
